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A Streamlined Approach

In the Scriptures, wind is used by way of analogy, to depict the dramatic effects that worldliness and false doctrine can have on a preacher not sufficiently rooted and grounded in the Bible, as well as his position in Christ (Ephesians 4:14, James 1:6, Jude 12). As winds of opposition increase in the days ahead, preachers must be readied, through specialized training, to shed the effects of them.

The concept of something being streamline can be readily understood by all. For example, it is amazing how water droplets cling to a car going down the highway as though there is no wind resistance. The air flow over a vehicle of high tech design today, is so redirected that a flimsy insect, while in plain view of the driver, can be transported far away from its habitat while a passenger on the hood of a car!

In the late 1930s, when smooth lines and rounded corners were an aesthetic trend in car, architecture, and even furniture design, J. Frank Norris and Louis Entzminger, took

a streamline approach to educating preachers for the ministry when they started the school that was to become the Bible Baptist Seminary. They did it though, for different reasons than being stylish, or looking good in the eyes of men. They saw the need to shed excess subjects of study that displaced more substantive and purpose-directed courses. The school they started was singular in its objective to train preachers, and their wives for the ministry. They taught them the whole English Bible, theology, and subjects directly related

to church ministry. In otherwords, the part-Bible and part-liberal arts practice that was already common in their day, and had largely been their educational experience years before, was disregarded. The result? Their graduates went on to build some of the most influential ministries of the 20th century.

When the Norris Bible Baptist Seminary began in 1984, it took the same approach the old BBS did. Consequently, there is no excessive drag upon the student financially, academically, or timewise. Costs are low, because the school is debt free and does not have large maintenance concerns, and the faculty is made up of pastors who already have a primary income. All courses are in Bible, theology, church

ministry, and practical Christian living. Even the English courses are ministrydirected! All subjects are in-depth, very focused, and fitted soley for training preachers and their wives. While in school, as a student serves in his church, he is further refined in the "windtunnel of experience", while being inwardly shored up theologically and practically by his pastor, and his instructors at NBBS.

More good Christian colleges are needed all across the nation, but there is a place for schools specializing in the training of preach-

ers. Since the Bible is so singularly what a pastor is to impart to his people, according to Scriptural mandate (Acts 20:27-28; Il Timothy 3:16-17, 4:1-2, etc.), he must know it well, and truly love it, to do so.

A preacher-in-training's time should not be spent in academic pursuits that are not related to him getting further grounded in the Word (Ephesians 5:16). Ahead of all other pursuits, he need not only to become dynamic in his presentation of it, but also "aerodynamic" in his practice of it. "Sanctify them through they truth: thy word is truth." John 17:17
